

GRANGEGORMAN MILITARY CEMETERY

Largest military cemetery in Ireland, it was founded in 1876 for the Marlborough Calvary Barracks (now McKee Barracks) near the Phoenix Park. Contains remains of soldiers (and their families) who served in both the UK and across the Empire. Includes children's graves some of whom came from the Royal Hibernian Military School nearby. Managed by the OPW, who won a Green Flag Award in 2015 for its management of this cemetery park.







NATIONAL WAR MEMORIAL GARDENS — ISLANDBRIDGE

Sir Edwin Lutyens's famous tranquil garden on the banks of the Liffey was built in 1930s to commemorate more the 49,000 Irishmen who died during the Great War. At the garden centre lies the Great War Memorial Stone, surrounded by circular fountains which in turn are enclosed by pairs of pavilions (the 'book rooms'), pergolas and sunken rose gardens. Restored by OPW and the Trustees of the Irish National War Memorial gardens from 1985-93.




Islandbridge Memorial Gardens - sunken garden, pavilion & pergola
